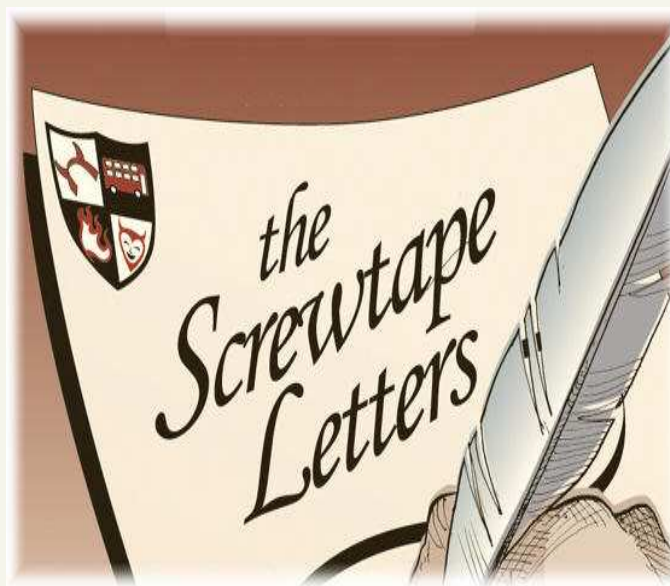

It provides a Christian education, vocational training, life skills, music and art, community awareness, opportunities for Christian service, and more. For the past three summers UPC has sent teams of university students (deputies) to work with children at Asha Kiran.

— actually, this is three ministries in one: a theology/ministry training school offering several degree programs; a day school providing Christian education to 1,700 local children of mostly Hindu background; and a residential school for the children of graduate missionaries serving in the field. India Partnership helps fund the education of six theological students each year.

— headquartered in New Delhi, this network of 20 Christian-based hospitals and 27 Community Health and Development projects throughout northern India aims to reflect Christ's love and transform lives through caring and expertise. UPC has sent several medical teams to serve short-term with EHA.

— serving people of all backgrounds, CCC is respected for its faith-centered and holistic approach to mental and emotional health for individuals, families, and communities. Dr. BJ Prashantham, director of CCC, teaches classes in Cross-Cultural Counseling at Fuller Seminary, NW Extension, in Seattle twice a year. India Partnership closely partnered with CCC in 2005 by raising funds to help provide long-term, culturally sensitive trauma counseling to over 8,000 tsunami survivors.

### Bible Society of India

— translates, prints and distributes Bibles and gospel literature, including audiotapes and videos, for many language and people groups throughout India previously without a Bible. We currently support three such Bible projects.
